



HISTORY OF CAJUN & ZYDECO MUSIC



AMÉDÉ ARDOIN (1898-1942)

Ardoin is considered to be a very important influential musical figure for both Cajun and Zydeco music as he was a Creole accordion player and vocalist. Ardoin was known for his signature high singing voice as well as being a skilled accordionist. He often partnered up with Cajun fiddler, Dennis McGee (1893-1989).

Cajun music is an emblematic music of Louisiana and is rooted in the ballads of the Frenchspeaking Acadians of Canada.

Born Oran Guidry in Lafayette, Louisiana. Guidry played fiddle as well as the mandolin. He played alongside many Cajun musicians during his career.

NATHAN ABSHIRE (1915-1981)

Born in Gueydan, Louisiana. Amédé Ardoin, Creole musician, was a heavy influence on Abshire's accordion playing and singing style. One of his most well-known hits is "Pine Grove Blues" released in 1949, which is considered his signature song.

Born in Bayou Grand Louis, Louisiana. Balfa was a Cajun fiddler who came from a family of fiddlers. He played with his brothers and formed the Balfa Brothers. Some of great works included "Cajun Fiddle Old and New" and "Fait á la Main."

Choates released his own version of "Jolie Blonde" in 1946, and it is considered one of the best versions to ever be recorded of the song.

1930

Simien recorded "My Toot Toot" and released it 1985, which is one of the most successful Zydeco hits of all-time, even earned him a GRAMMY. He reenergized interest in Zydeco music with his international hit, and he spent time recording in his home studio in Lake Charles, purchased KAOK-AM Radio station, and several of his songs have become Zydeco staples, covered regularly by other bands.

IRY LEJEUNE (1928-1955)

Born in Pointe Noire, Louisiana. Lejeune along with Abshire is responsible for the reemergence of the accordion in Cajun music. He met Eddie Shuler, Lake Charles record producer, in 1947, and he let Lejeune play his accordion on the radio and eventually recorded at Shuler's Goldband Records. Lejeune went on to become a successful and influential Cajun artist selling many records, some included "Lacassine Special" and "Calcasieu Waltz," spending much of his life South of Lacassine.

STEVE RILEY AND THE MAMOU PLAYBOYS (1980s)

Popular internationally known Cajun band found by Steve Riley in the late 1980s. Some of the band's many albums include, La Toussaint, Grand Isle, and Bon Rêve.

JOSEPH FALCON (1900-1965)

Popular Cajun vocalist and accordionist in the early twentieth century. He recorded the first Cajun record, along with his wife Cleoma **Breaux Falcon**, (1905-1941).



Early in the evolution of Cajun & Zydeco traditions, there were musicians who influenced the emergence of Zydeco with their musical styles. These musicians represent the blended roots of Cajun & Zydeco music.

ALPHONSE "BOIS SEC" **ARDOIN** (1915-2007)

Born in Duralde, Louisiana. Bois Sec was Amédé Ardoin's cousin. A self-taught accordionist, Ardoin formed a partnership with Creole themselves the Duralde Ramblers. They released an album in 1966 called Le Blues du Bayou, which consisted of French ballads and

fiddler Canray Fontenot and called quick two step. He also was the front of the Ardoin Brothers Band along with collaborating with other Cajun/ Zydeco bands throughout his career.

> **ALDUS ROGER** (1916-1999)

Born in Carencro, Louisiana. He was an accordion player who was strongly inspired by Lawrence Walker and Amédé Ardoin. Roger was leader of the Lafayette Playboys.

(BORN 1929)

CLIFTON CHENIER (1925-1987)

He was known as the "King of Zydeco" during his career and is still considered "King of Zydeco" to his many followers and fans today. Amédé Ardoin was a major influence for him in his music. Chenier recorded his first record at Lake Charles radio station, KAOK-AM, that was later picked up by a major record company in Los Angeles. Some of his many hits from his records included "Boppin' the Rock" and "Ai 'Tit Fille (Hey Little Girl)."

1929

Born Ida Lee Lewis, Queen Ida, was raised in a musically talented family, learning to play the accordion and piano. She was the first Zydeco artist to tour in Japan, later touring in Africa, Australia and New Zealand. Her band was featured on Saturday Night Live in 1985. She's a GRAMMY winning artist who has also won 4 Blues Music Awards.

BOOZOO CHAVIS (1930-2001)

1930

Born in Lake Charles, Louisiana. First hit was "Paper in My Shoe." Chavis was crowned as "The King of Zydeco" in New Orleans in the 1990s, and every September, crowds can hear Chavis family members and other Zydeco musicians playing music during the Boozoo Chavis Labor Day Festival in Lake Charles.

IMPORTANT MUSICIANS IN EARLY CAJUN MUSIC

1950

Sady Couriville, Wade Frugé, and Amédé Breaux The mid-30s and early to mid-40s, the accordion was rarely used as the main instrument, it was during this time period that the fiddle played the key instrument in Cajun music. This era is often referred to as the string-band era of Cajun music. New popular Cajun musicians emerged from this time period.

JOHN DELAFOSE AND THE EUNICE **PLAYBOYS**

1970

The band was one of the most successful Zydeco bands in the Gulf coast. Some of their releases included "Heartaches and Hot Steps," "Joe Pete Got Two Women," and "Zydeco Excitement."

1992 BALFA TOUJOURS

1990

The group formed out of Basile, Louisiana in 1992 as a tribute to the Balfa Brothers Band. Some of their albums include, La Pointe and Deux Voyages.

THE HACKBERRY RAMBLERS

The Cajun group was found in 1933 by Luderin Darbone and Edwin Duhon. Darborne learned to play the fiddle at 10 years old. Years later he partnered up with childhood friend, Edwin, who played the accordion and guitar. The original lineup included, Darborne as bandleader, Lennis Sonnier as vocalist; the guitarists of the group were Glen Croker, Lonnie Rainwater, Floyd Shreve, and Jose Werner, Jonnie Parket on bass and Edwin playing accordion and eventually guitar in band. By 1935, the group was the most successful Cajun band in Southwest Louisiana. One of their earliest successful records was their version of "Jolie Blonde" released in 1936. They were the first to use electronic amplification in Southwest Louisiana.

BEAUSOLEIL AVEC **MICHAEL DOUCET**

One of the most well-known Cajuns groups. They have released dozens of albums and tour all around the world. Some of their many albums include, The Spirit of Cajun Music, Bayou Boogie, Cajun Conja, and Gitane Cajun.
